

Toast to Preservation

Historic Centennial Neighborhood Association had the honor and pleasure of presenting four *Pride of Centennial* awards this year at the annual "Toast to Preservation" May 21. The awards recognize projects in the neighborhood that preserve and enhance the historic architectural character of the neighborhood. The award winners recognize the crucial importance of maintaining this unique historic flavor, and thus are major contributors to Historic Centennial Neighborhood's program to make the neighborhood a destination place. A place to live... to work... to play.

Julie Ginn and Tim Reiss were recognized for their restoration on the 1870s Italianate style house at 418 North 6th St. In the process they also **DOWNSIZED** from a 3-unit rental to a duplex.

From its inception in 1829, Historic Centennial Neighborhood, has been a mixed-use neighborhood with some buildings being built <u>originally</u> as apartments. Kings Manor Apartments, 422 North 6th, ca 1910, was designed as a large-scale urban apartment complex. *Julie and Tim did extensive restoration of Kings Manor and saved much of the original interior items.* Kings Manor's architecture can be a wonderful model for new apartments in historic urban settings. We appreciate their sensitive work on these two properties.

First Christian Church and Trinity United Methodist Church were honored for their appreciation of the historic architecture of the original churches while making them handicap accessible. These projects prove that making a building ADA accessible <u>can</u> be accomplished without adversely affecting the historic character of the building and can well serve as an example to others on how new design can complement an historical building.

CONGRATULATIONS, DICK NAGEL! The Wabash Valley Trust for Historic Preservation established a new historic preservation award in honor of the late Lafayette City Council member, Johanna Downie. Johanna is missed by many and we will never forget her unwavering support of Centennial Neighborhood. The trust honored Centennial's own Dick Nagel to be the recipient of this award. A very deserving recognition as Dick has worked for many years in historic preservation. Dick not only lives in Centennial Neighborhood, but also is part owner of the Loeb House Inn Bed and Breakfast also located in the neighborhood. Dick is on the board of the Centennial Neighborhood Association.

Brownstones and Row Houses Near Completion

Construction is progressing rapidly on two related projects by Paradigm Development on North 5th Streeteight two-story brownstone residences, each with a rental unit underneath, and four row houses. The builders worked closely with Centennial Neighborhood to choose designs that would complement existing historic architecture. The units are for sale as owner-occupied properties. Buyer incentives include subsidies for down payments. Information on the property is available from Lafayette Neighborhood Housing Services, 423-1284.

When construction is complete, Centennial Neighborhood Association is planning to celebrate with a street party.

Neighborhood Revitilization

Revitilization efforts are making great progress. Centennial Neighborhood worked two years on a landuse plan and rezoning according to NUZO. The new zoning plan has worked well in that it helped foster the North 5th St. Brownstones and Rowhouses project. Also, a former commercial property has turned into a family home, two multi-rental properties were purchased, downsized, and are now owner-occupied. This is to say nothing about the exterior and interior improvements that have been made on each of the properties. They look wonderful!
